The process has changed since 80s/90s

- Online
- SAT = ACT (really!!)
- Holistic review
- Applications have skyrocketed
 - More selective/competitive
- Legacy plays less of a role
- Admission plans
- Students visit campuses more
- Demonstrated Interest



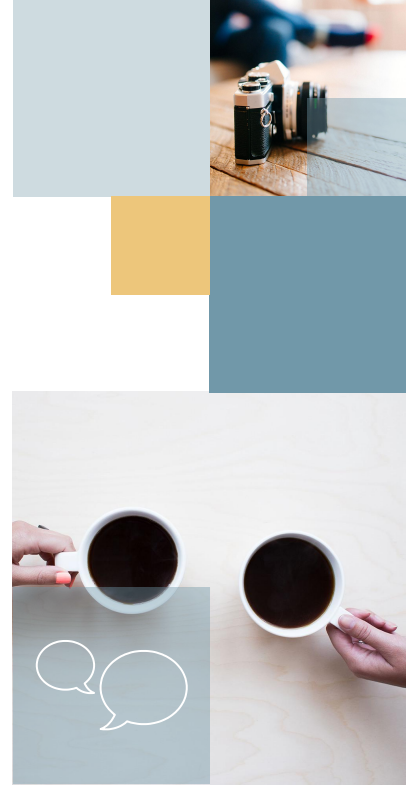
How is the process different in the U.S. than other countries

- Rankings are more subjective - not governmental
- There isn't a "best" school in particular areas
- Undergrad is typically 4 years
- In particular with highly selective schools, there is **no** GPA or test score that guarantees admission
- Admission is holistic
- Visiting is important
- Applications happen in the fall of **senior year**
- Accelerated programs are rare, and very competitive
- Undecided is okay (and common)

How to Choose a College:

Academics:

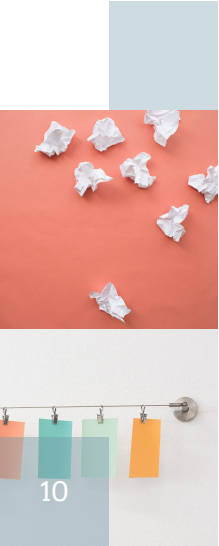
- Internships, co-ops, study abroad, direct admit programs, support, etc.
- In many instances, you do not need to choose your major until the end of the 2nd year of college!
- Discover what interests you



How to Choose a College:

Requirements for Admission

- Core Subjects
 - World Language
- Fine Arts (CA public schools, University of Washington in Seattle)
- Min. GPA
- ACT/SAT (maybe)



How to Choose a College: Location, Distance, and Size

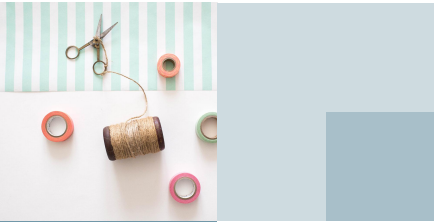
- Distance – consider logistics of coming home
- Setting: Rural, Urban, Suburban
 - Urban can be a defined or blended into the city.
- Size: Small (under 5,000) vs Large (15,000+)



How to Choose a College:

“I want something bigger than the size of SHS.”

- Value of smaller schools
 - Smaller class sizes
 - More personalized experiences
 - Closer relationships with professors
 - Resources and research opportunities may be easier
- No college is one building 😊
- Majority of colleges are smaller than *SHS*

- Do I have special needs?

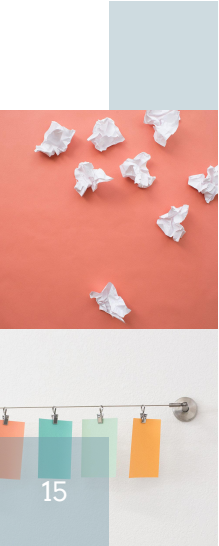
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How to Choose a College:

- Have “*the talk*” about cost
- Public vs. Private
- “Sticker Shock” - Use the Net Price Calculators
- Need vs. Want
- Ability vs. Willingness
- “Scholar”- ships (Merit)
 - How to look

How to Choose a College:

A school that is a reach for some, may be a target for others.

Safety Schools

- “Slam Dunk” for admission
- Financially reasonable

Target Schools

- Meet all admission requirements
- Financially attainable

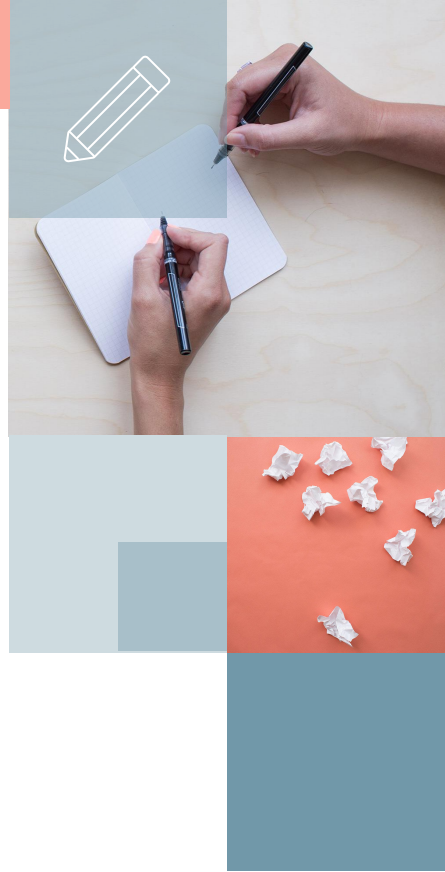
Reach Schools

- May be deficient in some admission requirements
- May be a financial reach
- **All colleges with under 25% admit rate (regardless of students academics)**

Dispelling Rumors

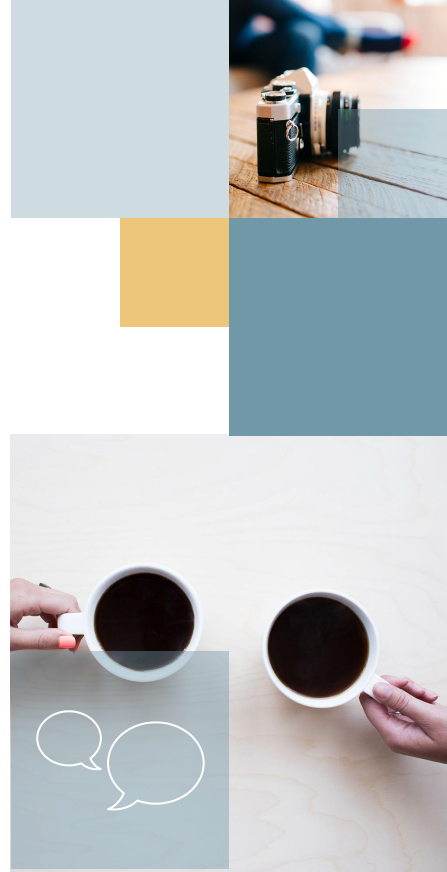
- UIUC (or anyone else for that matter) does not have a SHS admission quota

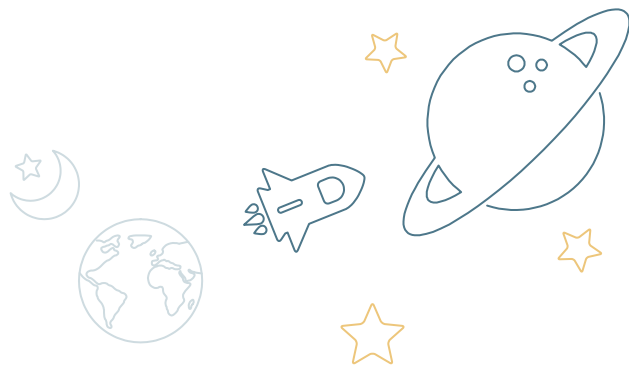

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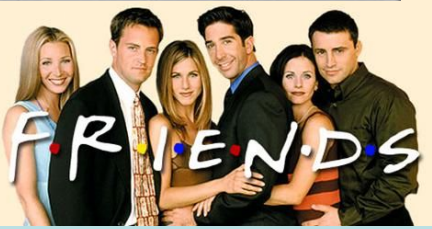




Parents/Guardians, if you applied to college, how many colleges did you apply to?

What is your guess on how many colleges a SHS student applies to on average?



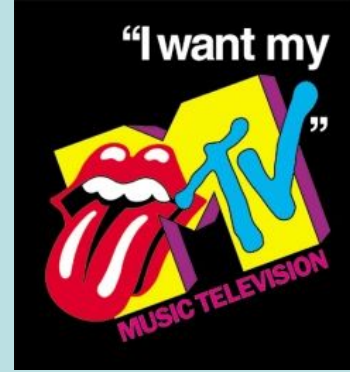


In 1990...

Price of gas \$1.08 a gallon

Ford Mustang Convertible \$15,000

UIUC total cost was \$6,500



Then and Now...

- 1990
 - Columbia U admit rate was 32%...in 2020 it was 6.3%
 - U of Michigan admit rate was 64%...in 2020 it was 26%
- 1997
 - Northwestern had a 32% admit rate...in 2020 it was 9%
 - Vanderbilt had a 66% admit rate...in 2020 it was 11.6%
- 2001
 - Tulane had a 61% admit rate, in 2020 it was 11%

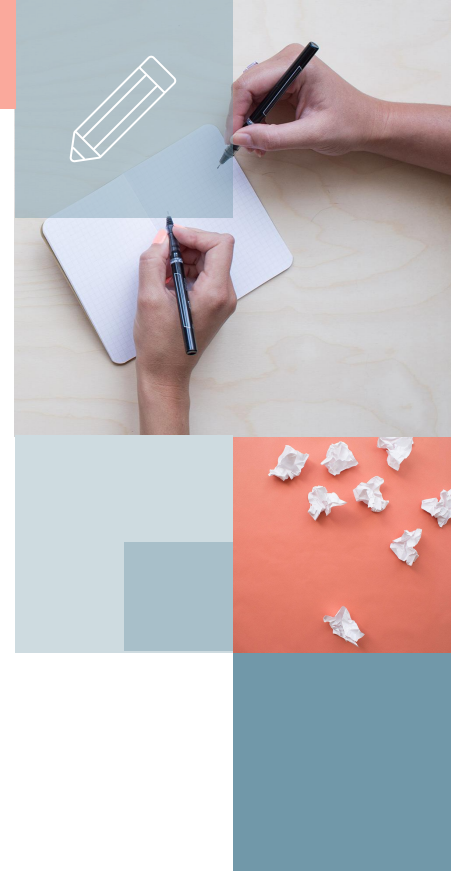
Take Away

- *Things have changed...*
- *More applications by students and for schools*
- *Lower admit rates (higher selectivity)*
- *Harder to predict*
- *< 25% admit rate = "reach/highly selective schools"*
- *Use Naviance to help gauge*
- *Avoid those "other" sites*

How a College Chooses You:

Holistic Admissions - *Highlights*

- High School Transcript
- ACT/SAT Scores – Writing/Essay?
- Essays/Writing Samples
- Counselor and/or Teacher Recommendations
- Demonstrated Interest
- Choice of Major(s)
- Co-curriculars/Work
- Diversity, Legacy, State or Country of Residence



Changes due to the Pandemic

- *Transcript details even more valued*
- *Test scores may still be optional...*
 - *Test-blind movement (NIU, Cal Tech)*
 - *SAT Subject tests*
- *May have additional essays*
- *Graded paper/essay/assignment*
- *Letters of Recommendation*
- *Demonstrated interest looks different*

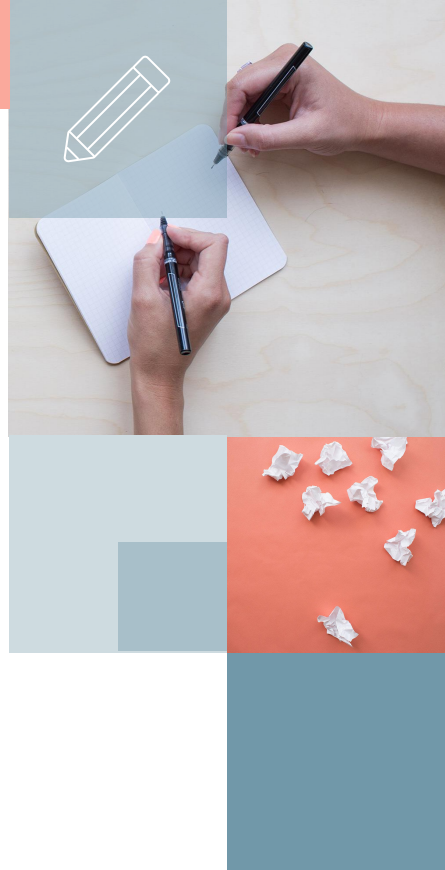

How a College Chooses You:

High School Transcript

- Many colleges admit on 6 semesters
- Weighted GPA
- Looking for a college prep curriculum:
 - English: 4 years Math: 3-4 years
 - Science: 3-4 years Social Studies: 3-4 years
 - World Language: (same) 2+ years/levels
 - Fine Arts: 1 year**

** (CA Public, 1 semester for UW Seattle)

- Grades in college prep classes most important
- Grade trends
- Senior classes



How a College Chooses You:

SAT/ACT Scores

- All colleges (who aren't test blind) will accept SAT or ACT
- Colleges will look at the best Composite Score
- Superscore? ACT Section testing?
- "not a co-curricular activity"
- SAT subject tests may be required or recommended by highly selective colleges (www.compassprep.com and college sites)
- Some schools require all testing history
- Self-reporting scores may be an option



How a College Chooses You: Essays and/or Writing Samples

- Hear *student's* voice
- Personalize to the college – “why us”
 - Take notes during visits
- Summer School Workshops
- Save a graded paper- sometimes a college will ask for one



How a College Chooses You:

Teacher vs. Counselor Recommendations

Teacher

- Usually a “core” academic teacher often junior year.
- May ask before summer, but know requirements, and avoid “over” asking.

Counselor

- Big picture perspective of your time during high school.
- Hiccups, challenges, personal circumstances.
- You in context of your high school.
- SCoPE Meetings



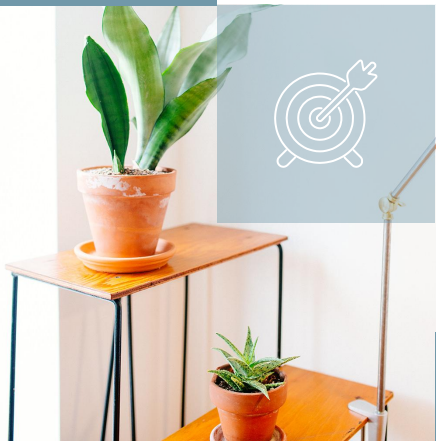
How a College Chooses You:

Demonstrated Interest



Students can “demonstrate interest”:

- Attend a college fair (virtual counts!)*
- Schedule an official campus visit or attend a virtual visit*
- Visit with reps at SHS and/or in the Chicagoland area.*
- Email/call colleges with questions (not easily found online)*
- Respond to emails that ask for a response*
- Essays*
- Interviews (if offered)*



How a College Chooses You:

Majors

- Some colleges directly admit students to certain programs
- Some programs are often direct admit (“more selective”):
 - Nursing
 - Engineering
 - Architecture
 - Business
- Undecided is okay!!!

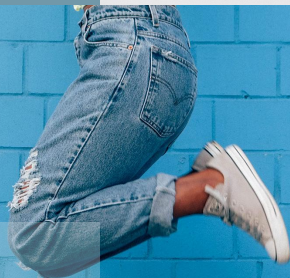


How a College Chooses You:

After 3:25 pm, Weekends, and Summer



- What do you like to do?
- How have you furthered your interests?
- Quality over quantity - meaningful engagement
- Looking for activities from Grades 9 – 12
- Colleges DO understand the past year has been challenging



How a College Chooses You:

Other Admission Factors

- Athletics / Talent
- Legacy (not a big factor)
- Diversity (in all areas)
- Admission plan used and deadlines



How a College Chooses You:

Admission Plans

Early Decision (ED) – binding agreement, student is committing to enroll if admitted and must rescind all other applications

ED I or ED II are possible

Restrictive Early Action (REA) or Single Choice Early Action – not binding, but restricts how a student can apply to other colleges (will vary from school to school, see website for details)



How a College Chooses You:

Admission Plans

- Early Action (Priority) – non-binding, “no strings attached” plan. Scholarship money is often tied to this deadline. Strong preference given to these applications.
- Regular – later in cycle
- Rolling – Notifications are rolled out through the cycle, as applications are processed
- Open Enrollment – Community Colleges

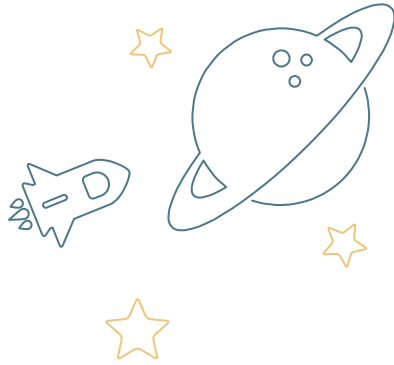
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Next Steps: Research Career Interests



- Discover what interests you:
 - **Utilize your resources:** Naviance Assessments. Career Exploration Program, shadowing, events, programs and career panel - check out the website (<https://www.d125.org/academics/career-exploration>)



Career Exploration Program

Mrs. Diane Willock, SHS Career Program Manager



- **Job Shadowing.** Students can participate in a half-day to full-day job shadow with a mentor in their interested career.
- **Professional Career Presentations.** Professionals present in either an individual classroom or in the College/Career Center.
- **Email Mentorship.** Students can participate in an email membership
- Career Expo
- Summer job fair-usually in spring
- Mock Interviews
- Summer Career Courses-M&H, Business, Law, STEM-all in June
- SPARK/Internships-summer-4-6 weeks
- General career guidance and planning
- Resume help



Why do Career Exploration in High School?

- Uncover likes/dislikes
- Provides knowledge on what type of education and skills are needed to succeed
- Provides sense of direction
- Provides motivation to succeed
- Increases sense of confidence about future

****Especially
important for
upperclassmen**



- **Make connections**
- ***Helps to make a better, more informed choice on college and major***

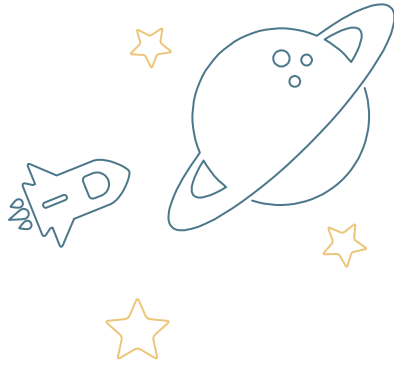

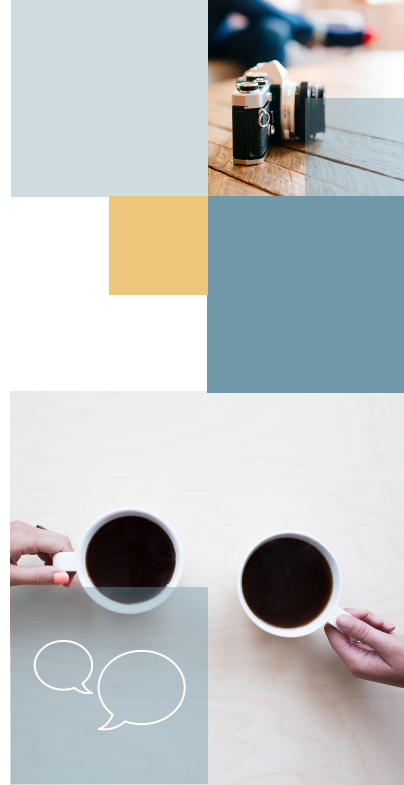

- Military Week - week of Veterans Day
- Trades Week: week of Nov. 16th
- Community College Week: week of Nov. 30th

Next Steps:

Role of Community College

- Potentially earn transferable college credits.
- Significantly reduced tuition.
- Pathway for transfer to four-year institution.
- Opportunity for fresh start.
- Gain classroom knowledge/skills within challenging academic areas.




Next Steps:

How To Do Research

- Create a list of essential questions for you to have answered.
- Naviance and other search tools (College Board/Big Future).
- Use the CCC and the individual college websites.
- College fairs (virtual for now).
- College rep visits (fall of senior year, use Canvas).
- Visit college campuses (virtual is an option too).
- Speak to friends and family about their experiences.

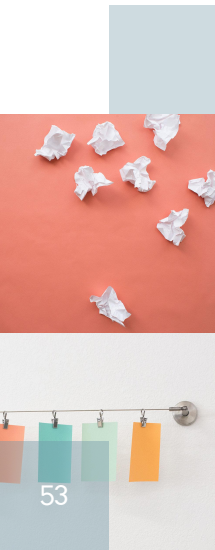
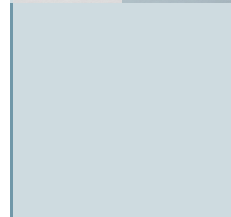

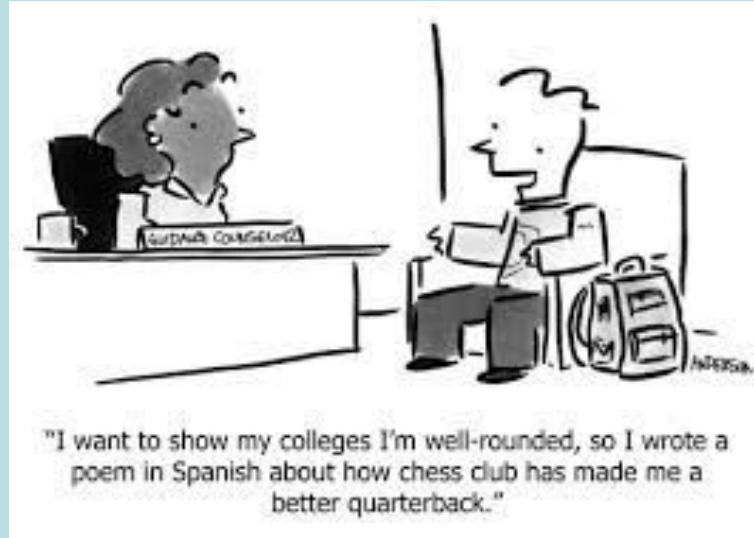


Next Steps: Parting Thoughts
